What happens now?

A bowel cancer screening practitioner will give you a courtesy call tomorrow. You will be advised of any results and any possible follow-up in approximately one week's time.

Recovering from your colonoscopy

Drugs used for sedation remain in the body for at least 24 hours and gradually wear off. During this period, although you may feel wide awake, you will still be under the influence of the sedation. Your concentration and co-ordination may be impaired and you may feel light-headed or faint.

It is very important to observe the following instructions:

- If you have had sedation, a responsible person should accompany you home and stay with you for 12 hours or overnight.
- Do not drive a car or other vehicle – your insurance is invalid for the 24-hour period – or operate machinery for 24 hours
- You should not sign any legally-binding agreements for 24 hours or make important decisions
- Do not drink alcohol for 24 hours
- Do not lock the bathroom or toilet door, or make yourself inaccessible to the person looking after you
- Drink plenty of fluids

Common side-effects

- Mild bloating/wind pain
You may experience some bloating/wind discomfort as your bowel has been inflated with air during your procedure, but this usually settles quickly. To help relieve this you may like to try some of the following: walking around, drinking warm fluids, lying on your left-hand side with your knees up and a hot water bottle on your tummy.
- 'Spotting' from your back passage
During your procedure you may have had polyps removed or biopsies taken, and as a result you may experience spots of blood for a day or two.

Infrequent side-effects

- Severe abdominal pain (not cramp caused by trapped wind)
- A firm-to-touch and swollen abdomen
- Passing a sudden and large amount of blood (more than half a tea cup full) from your back passage
- A high temperature (greater than 38 degrees)
- Vomiting

If you experience any of these during the 48-hour period after your colonoscopy, you can ask for help from:

Reporting side-effects

As the more-severe side-effects are unusual, we would be grateful if you could let us know if you believe you have suffered from one that is related to your colonoscopy, so we can monitor our service and continually strive to improve it:

- Excessive bleeding from your bottom following the procedure ('spotting' is OK)
- Pain (in excess of 'windy' pains, which are normal after a colonoscopy)
- An unexpected visit/admission to hospital relating to the colonoscopy in the next **30 days**
